## COMMITTEE ACTION

February 27, 2025

The Committee on Homeland Security met, pursuant to notice, in an open markup session, with a quorum being present, on Wednesday, February 26, 2025, at 10:00 a.m. EST in 310 Cannon to consider the following measures:

Authorization and Oversight Plan of the Committee on Homeland Security 119<sup>th</sup> Congress;

H.R. 1000, (Mr. Green of Tennessee) The “Providing Individuals Various Opportunities for Technical Training to Build a Skills-Based Cyber Workforce Act of 2025” or the “Cyber PIVOTT Act”;

H. Res. 113, (Mr. Thompson of Mississippi) Directing the Secretary of Homeland Security to transmit to the House of Representatives certain documents relating to Department of Homeland Security policies and activities related to the security of Department information and data and the recruitment and retention of its workforce;

H. Res. 114, (Mr. Thompson of Mississippi) Directing the Secretary of Homeland Security to transmit to the House of Representatives certain documents relating to Department of Homeland Security policies and activities related to domestic preparedness and collective response to terrorism and the Department's cybersecurity activities.

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The Committee took the following actions:

A motion by Mr. Green to adopt the Authorization and Oversight Plan of the Committee on Homeland Security for the 119<sup>th</sup> Congress, as amended; was AGREED TO by voice vote. A motion to reconsider was laid on the table.

A motion by Mr. Green to report H.R. 1000 to the House with a favorable recommendation was AGREED TO by a roll call vote of 17 Yeas and 8 Nays. (RC#01). A motion to reconsider was laid on the table.

A motion by Mr. Green to report H. Res. 113 to the House with an unfavorable recommendation was AGREED TO by a roll call vote of 13 Yeas and 8 Nays. (RC#02). A motion to reconsider was laid on the table.

A motion by Mr. Green to report H. Res. 114 to the House with an unfavorable recommendation was AGREED TO by a roll call vote of 13 Yeas and 10 Nays. (RC#03). A motion to reconsider was laid on the table.

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Committee on Homeland Security Oversight Plan for the 119<sup>th</sup> Congress.

The following amendments were offered:

An amendment offered by Mr. Magaziner (01):

Line 35, Page 5, replace the word “violent” with “racially, ethically and religiously motivated violent extremism, including.”

was WITHDRAWN.

An amendment offered by Mr. Goldman (02):

Add a new sentence on Page 2, Line 41, “The committee will investigate methods of disrupting the flow of American-made firearms to international criminal cartels, which fuel the violent and destabilizing activities of the cartels and threatens the safety of all Americans.”

was AGREED TO by voice vote.

An amendment offered by Mr. Magaziner (03):

Page 5, Line 35, strike “antisemitic”.

Page 5, Line 36, after “incidents,” insert “, including racially, ethnically, antisemitic, and religiously motivated violent extremism,”.

was AGREED TO by voice vote.

A motion by Mr. Green to authorize the Committee on Homeland Security Oversight Plan for the 119<sup>th</sup> Congress, as amended, to the House with a favorable recommendation was AGREED TO by voice vote.

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H.R. 1000, (Mr. Green of Tennessee), to amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to provide for education and training programs and resources of the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency of the Department of Homeland Security, and for other purposes.; the “Providing Individuals Various Opportunities for Technical Training to Build a Skills-Based Cyber Workforce Act of 2025” or the “Cyber PIVOTT Act”.

A motion by Mr. Green to report H.R. 1000 to the House with a favorable recommendation was AGREED TO by a roll call vote of 17 Yeas and 8 Nays. (RC#01)
