SUBCOMMITTEE ACTION

March 25, 2025

The Subcommittee on Counterterrorism and Intelligence met, pursuant to notice, in open markup session, a quorum being present, on Tuesday, March 25, 2025, at 2:00 p.m. in 310 Cannon to consider the following measures:

- H.R. 1327, (Mr. Luttrell) To direct the Secretary of Homeland Security to conduct a threat assessment of terrorist threats to the United States posed by individuals in Syria with an affiliation with a Foreign Terrorist Organization or a Specially Designated Global Terrorist Organization, and for other purposes; the “Syria Terrorism Threat Assessment Act”.
- H.R. 1508, (Ms. Titus) To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to authorize a program to assess the threat, vulnerability, and consequences of terrorism or other security threats, as appropriate, to certain events, and for other purposes; the “DHS Special Events Program and Support Act”.
- H.R. 1736, (Mr. Pfluger) To require the Secretary of Homeland Security to conduct annual assessments on terrorism threats to the United States posed by terrorist organizations utilizing generative artificial intelligence applications, and for other purposes; the “Generative AI Terrorism Risk Assessment Act”.
- H.R. 2116, (Mr. Evans of CO) To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to conduct a law enforcement support and counter transnational repression public service announcement campaign, and for other purposes; the “Law Enforcement Support and Counter Transnational Repression Act”.
- H.R. 2139, (Mr. Magaziner) To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to require the Secretary of Homeland Security to prioritize strengthening of State and local law enforcement capabilities to combat transnational repression and terrorism threats related to transnational repression, and for other purposes; the “Strengthening State and Local Efforts to Counter Transnational Repression Act”.
- H.R. 2158, (Mr. Pfluger) To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to authorize a dedicated transnational repression working group within the Department of Homeland Security to analyze and monitor transnational repression and terrorism threats related to transnational repression, and for other purposes; the “Countering Transnational Repression Act of 2025”.

H.R. 2212, (Mr. Mackenzie) To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to establish the Intelligence Rotational Assignment Program, and for other purposes; the “DHS Intelligence Rotational Assignment Program and Law Enforcement Support Act”.

H.R. 2259, (Mr. Tony Gonzales of TX) To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to require the development of a national strategy to secure elementary and secondary schools against acts of terrorism, and ensure domestic preparedness for and the response to terrorism, and for other purposes; the “National Strategy for School Security Act of 2025”.

H.R. 2261, (Mr. Hernández) To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to enhance the Department of Homeland Security’s oversight of certain intelligence matters, and for other purposes; the “Strengthening Oversight of DHS Intelligence Act”.

H.R. 2285, (Ms. Pou) To require reporting regarding accreditation of basic training programs of the Department of Homeland Security, and for other purposes; the “DHS Basic Training Accreditation Improvement Act of 2025”.
