A BILL

To authorize the Joint Task Forces of the Department of Homeland Security, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "DHS Joint Task
- 5 Forces Reauthorization Act of 2024".
- 6 SEC. 2. AMENDMENT TO SECTION 708 OF THE HOMELAND
- 7 SECURITY ACT OF 2002.
- 8 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 708(b) of the Homeland
- 9 Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 348(b)) is amended—

1	(1) in paragraph (9)—
2	(A) in subparagraph (A)—
3	(i) in clause (ii), by striking "and" at
4	the end;
5	(ii) in clause (iii)(II), by adding "and"
6	at the end; and
7	(iii) by adding at the end the fol-
8	lowing:
9	"(iv) a staffing plan for each Joint
10	Task Force;"; and
11	(B) by amending subparagraph (C) to read
12	as follows:
13	"(C) not later than December 23, 2024,
14	and annually thereafter, submit to the commit-
15	tees specified in subparagraph (B) a report con-
16	taining information regarding—
17	"(i) the progress in implementing the
18	outcome-based and other appropriate per-
19	formance metrics established pursuant to
20	subparagraph (A)(iii);
21	"(ii) the staffing plan developed for
22	each Joint Task Force pursuant to sub-
23	paragraph (A)(iv); and
24	"(iii) any modification to the mission,
25	strategic goals, and objectives of each

1	Joint Task Force, and a description of,
2	and rationale for, any such modifica-
3	tions."; and
4	(2) in paragraph (13), by striking "2024" and
5	inserting "2026".
6	(b) Annual Briefing.—
7	(1) In general.—Not later than 1 year after
8	the date of the enactment of this Act, and annually
9	thereafter, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall
10	brief—
11	(A) the Committee on Homeland Security
12	and Governmental Affairs of the Senate;
13	(B) the Committee on Commerce, Science,
14	and Transportation of the Senate;
15	(C) the Committee on Homeland Security
16	of the House of Representatives; and
17	(D) the Committee on Transportation and
18	Infrastructure of the House of Representatives.
19	(2) Topics.—Each briefing required under
20	paragraph (1) shall cover the latest staffing and re-
21	source assessment at Joint Task Force-East, includ-
22	ing—
23	(A)(i) a determination of whether the cur-
24	rent staffing levels of Joint Task Force-East
25	are sufficient to successfully advance the mis-

1	sion, strategic goals, and objectives of such
2	Joint Task Force; and
3	(ii) if such determination reveals insuffi-
4	cient staffing levels, the cost, timeline, and
5	strategy for increasing such staffing levels; and
6	(B)(i) a determination of whether suffi-
7	cient resources are being provided for Joint
8	Task Force-East in accordance with section
9	708(b)(7)(a) of the Homeland Security Act of
10	2002 (6 U.S.C. 348(b)(7)(a)); and
11	(ii) if such determination reveals insuffi-
12	cient resource levels, the cost, timeline, and
13	strategy for providing any remaining resource
14	requirements.
15	(c) REPORT ON JOINT TASK FORCE-EAST HEAD-
16	QUARTERS.—Not later than 1 year after the date of the
17	enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland Secu-
18	rity, in consultation with the Commandant of the United
19	States Coast Guard, the Commissioner for U.S. Customs
20	and Border Protection, the Director of U.S. Immigration
21	and Customs Enforcement, and the Administrator of Gen-
22	eral Services, shall submit a report to the congressional
23	committees listed in subsection $(b)(1)$ that analyzes the
24	cost and effectiveness of hosting the Joint Task Force-
